

As one of Britain's foremost constitutional experts and contemporary historians, Peter Hennessy has spent his professional life unpicking the arcane world of Whitehall and Westminster. Developing a network of insider contacts, he has shone light on some of the dustiest corners of the British establishment. As a journalist, prize-winning contemporary historian, and political commentator he has chronicled the workings of the British state with wit, affection, and a healthy sense of the absurd for over five decades.

In this new volume, he brings together selected journalism, unpublished lectures, and new writing alongside personal recollections and reflections on his time observing post-war Britain, how it is governed, and those who do the governing. He reflects on the making and unmaking of prime ministers from Attlee to Truss, life in the House of Lords, and the changing constitutional landscape in the wake of Brexit and in the midst of uncertainty about the Union.

Peter Hennessy's books have won multiple prizes, including the NCR, the Duff Cooper Prizes, and the Orwell Prize. They include the bestselling *The Prime Minister*, *The Secret State*, and, most recently, *A Duty of Care*. He was professor of contemporary British history at Queen Mary University of London, and in 2010 he was made an independent Crossbench Life Peer.



Making the Weather is a fascinating study of six politicians who 'made the weather' in post-war British politics and deeply influenced all our lives without achieving the highest office: an influence greater than that of most prime ministers. Vernon Bogdanor's cast includes three from the political Left – Aneurin 'Nye' Bevan, Roy Jenkins, and Tony Benn – and three from the Right – Enoch Powell, Keith Joseph, and Nigel Farage. Each study is a fascinating analysis that examines how these men achieved such prominence and influence and how, though very different figures in many ways, they came to dominate the political landscape, often for a period of years.

Each of the six made fundamental contributions to the debate about Britain's future and to the vibrancy of our democracy. From immigration to Europe, from the NHS to devolution, the issues and causes that brought these men to prominence are still of considerable contemporary relevance.

Vernon Bogdanor is professor of government at the Institute of Contemporary British History, King's College London. He has written a number of books on constitutional and political history, including *Beyond Brexit* and *The Strange Survival of Liberal Britain*.



Stefan Zweig was one of Europe's most popular writers of the early twentieth century, his work translated into over thirty languages.

In the Future of Yesterday offers a refreshing approach to the life and work of Austrian writer Stefan Zweig and delves into his considerable contribution to world literature, rooted in the Austro-Jewish tradition. A world traveller from the outset, he liked to uproot himself – but whether he stayed in London, New York or, eventually, Brazil, his literary baggage continued to contain the flair of fin de siècle Vienna.

This biography re-examines Zweig's influential time in England and offers new insights into his final years in the United States and Brazil; it discusses some of his prolific literary output in relation to his life; and takes his political views on Europe, Zionism, and the world order in greater depth than previous appraisals of Zweig's life. Most importantly though, *In the Future of Yesterday* presents Zweig as a towering figure of a form of writing that was bursting with 'life' and was written in the knowledge that there can only be a future if we remain conscious of the past.

Rüdiger Görner was professor of German with comparative literature at Queen Mary University of London. The founding director of the Centre for Anglo-German Cultural Relations, his books include biographies of Rainer Maria Rilke, Georg Trakl and Oskar Kokoschka.



Oskar Kokoschka (1886-1980) was an artist of his time, but he also stood out among his peers – not just because of his towering physical height but for his artistic range: he wrote plays and stories as well as essays on art and politics. Using both brush and pen to work against the tide, he played a major role in shaping European art in the twentieth century.

A rebel of the art world, he was used to controversy, and Rüdiger Görner's accomplished biography weaves the dark, unsettling aspects of Kokoschka's life among his more celebrated achievements: from the eerie doll he had made in the image of a former lover to the unconventional art school he founded in Salzburg in 1953. Taking us from his birthplace of Pöchlarn across Europe and to the United Kingdom, where he became a naturalised British citizen in 1947, this first English-language biography does more than show Kokoschka as a maverick artist; it is the definitive interpretation of an extraordinary life.

Rüdiger Görner was professor of German with comparative literature at Queen Mary University of London. The founding director of the Centre for Anglo-German Cultural Relations, his books include biographies of Rainer Maria Rilke, Georg Trakl and Stefan Zweig.

In the Gaza Strip, growing up on land owned by his family for centuries, eleven-yearold Yousef is preoccupied by video games, school pranks, and meeting his father's impossibly high standards. Everything changes when the Second Intifada erupts, and soldiers occupy the family home. Shot by an Israeli sniper at the age of fifteen, and taken to hospital in Tel Aviv, Yousef slowly and painstakingly confronts the paralysis of his lower body. 

In an accessible survey of the last century, *Contested Lands* tells the story of the Middle East since the First World War: what happened, why, and what it all means today. With a focus on the many conflicts in the region over the last one hundred years, T. G. Fraser analyses the faultlines of the tension: the damaging legacies of imperialism; the creation of the State of Israel; the competition between secular, autocratic rulers and emerging democratic and theocratic forces; and the rise – and fall – of Arab nationalism in the face of fraying regional alliances and the Islamic revival. Against this backdrop comes the twenty-first century, marked first by the tragedy of 9/11, then the Arab Spring, Syria's civil war and now the Israel-Palestine conflict. And in the midst of it all, complex social and economic change has transformed the region. In *Contested Lands*, T. G. Fraser untangles the threads of history in the Middle East and, in doing so, weaves a detailed and insightful picture of a troubled region and why its heritage remains important today.

T.G. Fraser is emeritus professor at Ulster University and the author of *Chaim Weizmann: The Zionist Dream* (2009) and, with Andrew Mango and Robert McNamara, *The Makers of the Modern Middle East* (2015).



GERMAN JERUSALEM

The Remarkable Life of a German-Jewish Neighbourhood in the Holy City



Planned at the beginning of the 1920s as a garden city on the fringes of Jerusalem, the suburbs of Talbiyeh and Rehavia became a centre of emigration for German Jews from 1933 onwards. The neighbourhood became a vibrant German–Jewish microcosm with residents including the poet and playwright Else Lasker-Schüler, the historian Gershom Scholem, and the philosopher and scholar Martin Buber. It was an idyllic setting, but life was also tough and could be unforgiving; the city had long been divided, and the residents of Talbiyeh and Rehavia found themselves caught up in the conflict. After the war, the recent history of the Shoah weighed heavily on the neighbourhood's inhabitants, but it also became a place of German-Israeli rapprochement. *German Jerusalem* is a story of a culturally distinctive community, and a fascinating biography of those who lived and worked there.

Thomas Sparr worked at the Hebrew University in Jerusalem's Leo Baeck Institute from 1986 to 1989. Today he lives in Berlin, where he works as an editor-at-large for Suhrkamp and as an independent writer and scholar.



SYRACUSE

Sicily's City of Stories



2,500 years ago, the city of Syracuse on the eastern coast of Sicily was, for the Ancient Greeks, one of the centres of the classical world. It was in Syracuse that Aeschylus premiered his plays, and to Syracuse that Plato would visit from Athens, where the tyrant Dionysius bought Euripides's lyre at an auction, and the languishing nymph Arethusa hid in the papyrus grove.

Living in the city, the poet Joachim Sartorius learned that this history and myth is still present today. At Sartorius's side we walk with nymphs and cyclops through the old town of Ortigia, and meet the people of the city; its notables, police officers, artists, and barbers. Unravelling the depths of Sicilian history and bringing the juxtaposition, superimposition, and commingling of cultures, styles, and attitudes to life, Sartorius shows a city of ancient luminosity, bringing us, through the baroque, to the contemporary world.

Joachim Sartorius is a poet, translator, and cultural critic. He grew up in Tunis and spent twenty years in the German diplomatic service in New York, Istanbul, and Nicosia. He was secretary general of the Goethe Institut until 2000, and from 2001–2011 he was director of the Berlin Festival. He is the author of *My Cyprus* and *The Princes' Islands*.

Glimpsing the British Constitution in the 2020s

In *The Kingfisher's Wings* contemporary historians Peter Hennessy and Andrew Blick trace the constitutional developments and tensions that have beset and shaken the UK in the decade since the 2014 Scottish independence referendum.

In this short, engaging study, the authors discuss what is foreseeable about the near- and medium-term future, before proposing an array of improvements and modifications that might preserve and enhance the nature of the British constitution. Hennessy and Blick believe that breaking the current cycle of decline before it plunges us into an even more dangerous politics of fatalism is a first order question for the United Kingdom of the mid-2020s.


